This is a designation awarded by the National Parkinson Foundation (www.parkinson.org) to healthcare institutions that excel in Parkinson's-related comprehensive care, research and community outreach programmes. Community Care Partners Programme: Introduction

The Community Care Partners Programme for Parkinson's Disease (CCPP) is Singapore's first-ever organised outreach programme with the primary aim of enhancing the delivery of community care and support to the Parkinson's Disease community by tapping on the well-integrated network of community healthcare facilities in Singapore. An initiative by the Parkinson's Disease and Movement Disorders Centre at National Neuroscience Institute (PDMDC NNI), the CCPP is a partnership programme with community care facilities that have a core team of healthcare professionals who have completed our series of training workshops.

Objectives

- To build partnerships with community healthcare facilities and voluntary welfare organisations by providing enhanced and coordinated multidisciplinary care and support to the Parkinson's community.
- To provide training, education and resources for community healthcare providers involved in the care and management of Parkinson's Disease patients, so as to ensure that they receive the best possible care at all levels of healthcare service.
- To provide patients and caregivers living with Parkinson's Disease a list of community resources available that are skilled in the care and management of Parkinson's Disease.

Role of Community Care Partners

Community Care Partners provide the crucial link between NNI and the PD patients in the community. The NNI-CCPP will ensure that the Parkinson's Disease community receives the best possible coordinated Parkinson's Disease care.

Benefits of Community Care Partners

Our Community Care Partners will benefit from the various training and educational resources as follows:

- Monthly rounds and interactive case discussions with our multidisciplinary team
- 4 - 6 monthly workshops and update sessions organised by PDMDC NNI
- Annual course and training workshops organised by NNI

The various update sessions, case discussions, and refresher courses/workshops will ensure that our Community Care Partners are kept up-to-date in Parkinson's Disease management, and to facilitate delivery of enhanced and coordinated Parkinson's Disease care to patients and caregivers in the community. Staff of our Community Care Partners will receive membership privileges to attend these training sessions free or at a discounted rate.
